Intisari

Penelitian ini dilakukan untuk menjelaskan makna dan signifikasi kematian untuk Oliver Sykes. Obyek dalam penelitian ini adalah lagu-lagu yang dipilih dari album Sempiternal *Can You Feel My Heart, The House of Wolves, Sleepwalking, Go to Hell for Heaven's Sake, Shadow Moses and And The Snakes Start to Sing*). Lirik yang dianalisis dalam penelitian ini diambil dari website resmi band, sedangkan teori dan data pendukung lainnya dikumpulkan dari artikel, jurnal dan buku baik ataupun *online*.

Penulis skripsi ini menggunakan *five stages theory* yang diprakarsai oleh Elisabeth Kubler-Ross.
